Who Should Attend

This program is designed for lawyers who want to better understand deception recognition, and learn how to apply credibility assessments in their day to day work.

About the Program

Every day lawyers make decisions about whether someone is telling the truth. We do it at home, at work, and in social situations. Most of us rely on stereotypical "signs" that a person is lying and we are no better at it than chance. However, what we think we see and hear in boardrooms and court rooms and other legal settings can have very serious consequences for us and the people we interact with. This exciting new course, featuring UBC Professor Dr. Michael Woodworth of the Centre for the Advancement of Psychological Science and Law (CAPSL), takes a critical look at the evolution of deception recognition, with a specific focus on the legal system. With references to the most up to date research available, and examples from his own studies and legal consultations, Dr. Woodworth will enhance legal professionals' understanding of deceit in a variety of contexts, as well as facilitate their knowledge of deception detection. Further, he will offer guiding principles for how to apply that information in practice, including interviewing, investigations, discovery, trial and negotiations.

About the Presenter



Michael Woodworth, PhD, is a Professor at UBC Okanagan. He received his Doctor of Philosophy 2004 from Dalhousie University. His primary areas of research include psychopathy, criminal behaviour, and deception with detection. Along colleagues, Dr. Stephen Porter and

Dr. Zach Walsh, Dr. Woodworth was awarded Canadian Foundation for Innovation funding to create the Centre for the Advancement of Psychological Science and Law. He has received additional grants to study language and psychopathy, and deception detection in on-line environments. Dr. Woodworth has collaborated on numerous research projects with the RCMP and Correctional Services of Canada, as well as forensic psychiatric services in both British Columbia and Nova Scotia. He regularly presents at national and international psychology conferences, consults with law enforcement agencies such as the RCMP and the FBI, and serves as an expert witness for the courts. He trains judges, police, lawyers, psychologists and others in understanding the truth about lie detection.
